The Bicentennial Time Capsule, said Evan, contains a representation of items that would be commonplace in Westlake of 2011. The Capsule will be buried at Evergreen Cemetery on Center Ridge Road at the base of the flagpole in this historic Westlake location.

Mayor Dennis Clough welcomed Evan and the Time Capsule project, saying that the community has once again responded in a way that represents the spirit of Westlake that has made the community what it is today.



North Coast Health Ministry Expands Hours to Monday Evenings

North Coast Health Ministry (NCHM), a free clinic serving the low-income uninsured in western Greater Cleveland, has begun offering primary care clinics on Monday evenings at its Lakewood location. The Monday evening clinic is being offered in addition to primary care clinics held during daytime hours Monday through Friday.

"It is our hope that our expanded hours will better serve patients who work during the day," says Executive Director Lee Elmore. "Now uninsured individuals who would have no alternative route to care during the evening will have a place to come for primary care. Individuals who would otherwise use the emergency room after hours for non-emergent needs can come to NCHM and be taken care of in the most appropriate setting."

North Coast Health Ministry's Monday evening clinic is by appointment only and takes place at 16110 Detroit Avenue, Lakewood, Ohio.

How To Become a Patient at **North Coast Health Ministry**

Did you know North Coast Health Ministry provides free health care, preventative and chronic disease management, medical tests, behavioral/mental counseling, prescription assistance and so much more in your community?

If you are a low-income, uninsured individual or family, you may be eligible! North Coast Health Ministry serves people earning up to 250% of the poverty level (income level varies based on family size) within 17 zip codes in Northwestern Cuyahoga or Northeastern Lorain counties.

Become a patient in three simple steps:

1. Call NCHM at 216-228-7878 and asked to be screened as a new patient.

2. Return the information packet, along with proof of income and residency, in person or through the mail to become registered.

3. Attend a walk-in clinic offered Monday through Friday at 8:30 AM and see a medical professional that day or call to schedule an appointment.

Even if you do not have an immediate medical need, becoming a registered patient of North Coast Health Ministry will provide you with a medical resource should the need arise.



Nature Center Staffer Achieves Prestigious First

Amy LeMonds of Lake Erie Nature & Science Center in Bay Village has become the first rehabber in the state of Ohio to be certified by the International Wildlife Rehabilitation Council (IWRC).

The IWRC is an organization that the Center has belonged to for 17 years," explained LeMonds, "and I had attended their basic rehabilitation courses during my studies and early career here. When I earned that the IWRC was making strides in providing an official certification to help develop the profession of wildlife rehabilitation, I immediately wanted to get involved. I felt that this new certification was important to support and obtain because I think it helps to create a level of respect for the profession. It requires continuing education coursework to maintain and hopefully will help to set high standards for rehabbers in the future."

LeMonds joined the nonprofit Center in 2005 and after several years of working alongside Director of Wildlife Dave Wolf and cross-training in several areas of the Center's Wildlife Department, LeMonds was appointed Wildlife Rehabilitation Coordinator in 2008. "This achievement not only shows Amy's dedication and the pride she takes in her profession," commented Wildlife Director Wolf, "but also shows the high standard of excellence Lake Erie Nature & Science Center strives to provide to our constituents."

The Center has been offering Wildlife Rehabilitation & Education services at no charge to the public since the 1940's. As well as belonging to organizations like the IWRC and various state and national rehabilitation associations, the Center also maintains permits to operate from the United States Fish & Wildlife Service and the Ohio Division of Wildlife. In 2011, the Center admitted over 1000 wild animals in need of care and assessed an additional 200+ which were immediately returned to the wild. "Our team works hard every day," said LeMonds, "offering assistance to

injured wildlife, with the ultimate goal of releasing back into the wild. But we also hope to educate the public and to inspire them to such a degree that, together, we can truly make a positive impact on wildlife."

LeMonds' high regard for this new certification is clear: "This is a major development in the field," she said. "Thanks to connections forged through IWRC, I've even been able to call upon the expertise of rehab professionals around the country. This certification not only makes me better at what I do, but takes the wildlife rehabilitation profession to a new level."


I love the part of the church service when they call for all the young children to step forth and march off to their Sunday school session.
