The Real 007 Celebrates a Lifetime of 'Continuing Education' Through LCCC

Still proud of her antiquated student number "00007," Georgeane Sue Jeager Poplar remembers the excitement of attending her first class at Lorain County Community College. It was 1964, before the college had its permanent campus on Abbe Road, and courses were held at Garford Elementary School in Elyria. Poplar's family couldn't afford to send her away to college, so she was grateful for the opportunity to earn an associate degree locally.

"It was a brick elementary building and it had three floors," Poplar recalls. "And I remember sitting in those classes and just being really excited that I was in college, learning and meeting lots of people."

Poplar's enthusiasm for learning didn't come without worry though. And it took some supportive professors to instill confidence in the young Poplar. Professors she remembers to this day.

"Mr. Gallagher was my American history teacher, and he did a wonderful job," she says. "He told us he was going to teach his class like he would at one of those state universities. And he did."

After graduating, there was a teacher shortage in Lorain County, so Poplar







The History of Bradstreet's Landing

One of Rocky River's best attractions is Bradstreet's Landing on the shores of Lake Erie just east of the Bay Village border. Its fishing pier has long been popular and was recently reopened after an extensive renovation.

Do you know the history of Bradstreet's Landing? Here it is, courtesy of the Case Western Reserve University Encyclopedia of Cleveland History:

BRADSTREET'S DISASTER, which occurred 1.7 miles west of Rocky River on October 18 and 19, 1764, is one of the most notable events in the presettlement history of Cleveland. In late summer 1764, British Colonel John Bradstreet, renowned as the hero of Fort Frontenac, proceeded from Fort Niagara to Fort Detroit with 2,300 British



regulars, American provincials, and Indians. Stopovers on this westward trek included the Cuyahoga and Rocky rivers on August 18 and 19. Initially part of a three-pronged assault to put down Pontiac's Rebellion, after Indian quiescence the mission became one of reinforcement, exploration, retrieval of captives, challenge of hostile groups, and peacemaking. On the return to Ft. Niagara from an extended encampment at Sandusky, Bradstreet's party found the otherwise safe shelter of Rocky River too treacherous for their 46-foot long bateaux to navigate because of darkness. Instead, on October 18 under a moonless sky, they rowed their 60 boats and 9 canoes, laden with 1,500 troops, to a swale near ROCKY RIVER (now the park,

Bradstreet's Landing). When an unexpected surge wave suddenly struck, the small-ship fleet was inundated by high water. These waves effectively incapacitated 25 boats and severely damaged many others. Three days were required for repair before further travel could be undertaken, and the shortage of boats necessitated that a portion of the party proceed over land. Bad weather severely hampered the progress of the boats, while shortages of food and supplies caused much hardship for the overland party. Although rumors of marchers' perishing exist, only a single fatality was confirmed in the struggle to return to Ft. Niagara.

began teaching fifth grade in Amherst. At the age of 19, she was less than a decade older than her students.

"The first year of teaching is always very challenging, but I loved it," she says. "Those students liked me a lot because I was young, and I had lots of energy. They had a lot of fun in my class. Way too much fun, probably."

That first, memorable academic year began a lifelong career in education. Poplar spent many of her teaching years in Amherst, where she grew up. There she taught kindergarten, third, fourth and fifth grades. She also spent time as a guidance counselor and intervention specialist.

Throughout the decades, Poplar has often been a student herself. She earned her bachelor's degree from Kent State University and her master's degree from The Ohio State University. Eventually, Poplar found her way back to LCCC, and her old "00007" student number, when she decided to earn a special education certificate through LCCC's University Partnership with Ashland University. Poplar was thrilled to have bragging rights with the young-

er students and yet another avenue to boost an already successful and rewarding career.

Today, at 76, Poplar is still working in education. She's an intervention specialist at Pathways to Success in Oberlin. She knows she'll retire one day. But for now, she simply "can't seem to let it go." And she cherishes the place it all began.

"LCCC gave me the opportunity of a lifetime to get into education," she says. "I am absolutely sure of that."

Cadets Graduate from LCCC Police Academy

A group of newly trained police officers are prepared to serve local communities after graduating from the Lorain County Community College Police Academy during a ceremony on December 22.

The class of 11 graduates joins the 20-year history of the LCCC Police Academy. In total, more than 720 graduates have completed the program since the academy began in 2002. LCCC is the number one location for first responder training in Lorain County, including police officers. The academy is recognized statewide as a STAR Academy Training Center, the highest award for Ohio police academies who consistently exceed training standards.

The high standards of the academy lead to many cadets finding employment prior to completing the program. Eight cadets in the graduating class are already employed or have received conditional offers from local police departments. The remaining cadets are completing interviews with area law enforcement agencies.

Cadet Devontae Bowens, 24 from Lorain, has received a conditional employment offer from Lorain Police Department. For Bowens, the thought of serving his hometown makes the offer even more special.

"Becoming a police officer is something I've wanted to do since I was a kid," Bowens said. "I'm glad I have the opportunity to give back to the community where I grew up."

To help fund his academy training. Bowens received the Ben-

To help fund his academy training, Bowens received the Benjamin G. and Sarah Jane Norton Police Academy Scholarship. Receiving scholarship support allowed him to focus on study-

ing and being successful in the academy, he said.

As Bowens and the rest of the cadets move to the next phase of their law enforcement pathways, LCCC Police Academy Commander Richard Thomas assured them they are well prepared after completing the 24-week academy.

"I charge you now to go forward to serve your communities with passion and honor, to be consummate lifelong learners, to value compassion as much as you do valor, and to always, stay safe," Thomas said.

Ready for Spring? Here Comes the Eclipse!

Are you ready for spring yet? Then get ready for the big event of the spring - April's total eclipse of the Sun!

"At 3:13 pm on Monday, April 8, 2024 Bay Village will be in the path of totality for a total solar eclipse," writes Bay Mayor Paul Koomar in his Winter Newsletter.

"Residents will experience four minutes of total darkness, which is among the longest times in northern Ohio. The next total eclipse in Ohio won't occur until 2099 so Bay Village (and surrounding communities) likely will have a large number of visitors, potentially doubling our population for the day. This estimate is based on information from past eclipses nationally.

"City buildings will be closed to the public and Cahoon Road in Cahoon Park will be closed, similar to closures at Bay Days. Bay Schools and St. Raphael's have extended their spring breaks by a day and will be closed on April 8th. Stores, businesses, and streets will be very busy that day, so please plan ahead. It's important to remember that viewing any part of the Sun directly or through a camera, binoculars, or a telescope lens without a special-purpose solar filter/glasses will cause severe eye injury. Approved solar filter/glasses must be used to protect your eyes. More information on the solar eclipse is available on the city website under 'Community.'"



Employee of the Year, NOT!

On 12/15/23, the suspect, a 26yo Elyria resident, was finally tracked down. He was arrested without incident and his case bound over to the Cuyahoga County Grand Jury.

Shoplifter Arrest



In all, 7 known vehicles were damaged. A semi-truck, carrying a large piece of construction equipment, also stopped. 


