



#### **Huntington Playhouse Renovations Continue**



The Huntington Playhouse theater floor has officially been leveled, and the cement is drying! BAYarts Executive Director Nancy Heaton, Director of Operations Beth Milli, and Board President Mary Conway Sullivan signed the wet cement to honor this huge step in the renovation.

Next up will be the interior finishes, with plans for the project to be ready for the community to enjoy in March. Stay

tuned for expanded programming, community events, and rental space when this next phase is complete

A beloved fixture of Bay Village has long been Huntington Playhouse in Huntington Reservation of the Cleveland Metroparks.

The stage has been dark for several years now. But BAYarts is well on its way to bringing the landmark back to life

'The Huntington Playhouse was established in 1958 and sits on the site of John Huntington's carriage house. It started as a small summer theater and grew into a place with a 240-seat auditorium. The Playhouse had its last season in 2015. In the summer of 2017 BAYarts began working to clean out the venue. The goal of BAYarts is to renovate the former Playhouse, so it can be used on the arts campus for a wide range of cultural programming.

The first phase of renovations was completed in January of 2019 and included new electrical and fire safety systems. Improvements also included new bathrooms and windows, and drywall in the Hearth Room (previously the space used for intermission). BAYarts currently uses the renovated west end of the building for classes, concerts, and as community meeting room.

A second phase of renovations to the theater space are

set to begin this summer. BAYarts intends to keep the stage and create a multiple use space to host concerts, plays, a speaker series, and more. The flexible event space will also be used for larger classes, weddings, and corporate events. BAYarts received a \$500,000 grant from the Ohio Facilities Construction Committee (OFCC) and raised an additional \$500,000 to begin Phase Two.

Further renovations to the building include the addition of two music rooms, a large classroom, a second set of bathrooms and a central hallway to facilitate accessibility throughout the building. Fundraising is ongoing for the next phase of improvements.

#### David Fisher Credits Lorain County Community College for a Successful Electrical Engineering Career

After David Fisher spent most of high school days just getting by to stay eligible for sports, he didn't have much desire to go to college. But his parents encouraged him to give it a try. Thankfully, he did. And choosing an engineering pathway was an obvious choice.

"My mom and dad said I always took apart every toy I had," Fisher says.

Two years later in 1970, he earned an associate degree in mechanical engineering from Lorain County Community College. In 1985 he came back for a second degree in electrical engineering. And he's held a State Electrical Contractors license for nearly 40 years.

"When I was in high school in machine shop class, we had a teacher that made you learn every part of the machine before you could even start it up," he says. "And then I remember coming to LCCC. It was all hands-on. And to me, that's the best way to learn."

Engineering employers tend to agree – and Fisher's career is proof of that.

Today, Fisher credits LCCC and its hands-on approach to learning for paving the way for his successful electrical engineering career that included positions with prominent Lorain County companies, like Ridge Tool Company.

"I was Ridge Tool's first electronic electrician," he says. "They were getting more into the CNC equipment and eventually they made me an electrical foreman over the whole plant."

Fisher's last role was as a senior electrical engineer at Forest City Technologies Inc. in Wellington. He spent nearly 30 years with the organization.

"Back when I started, they had about 60 people and they really didn't have anybody doing electrical work," Fisher recalls. "It ended up as one of the best moves I've made. They designed and built their own production equipment. I saw a lot of things happen there."

In his decades-long career, Fisher has come across many brilliant minds, who often trained at prestigious universities. And he says the hands-on LCCC education he received holds firm among others' education. And sometimes, inches out just above.

"I've had some colleagues and even bosses who've said I taught them more than their education did, in certain aspects, because with me it was all hands on," Fisher says.

**Community College** 

Fisher visited the LCCC campus in 2023, as the college celebrated its 60th anniversary. And as he sat in the new automation lab, which served as the drafting room in the late 1960s, he

marveled at the college's ability to keep pace with industry and keep its education experience based.


"I feel very fortunate that I came to LCCC. I'm able to design and build things, and make them work," he says. "And it's a great opportunity for young people today. And it's right here for everyone."

#### **Hit-Skip Driver Nabbed**

The female was provided resources through the Cuyahoga County Human Trafficking Task Force, of which the Westlake PD is a member.

#### **Shoplifter Identified**

He was wearing a black hat, black hooded sweatshirt and black jacket. The male also had a TATTOO UNDER an EYE which appeared to be writing of some sort. The female had stolen over \$1700 worth of merchandise. WPD posted photos of the couple on the department's social media pages believing that the public would be able help identify the thieves. Within 20 minutes the couple and vehicle were tentatively identified. Charges are expected.
