

## **Story of the Year** SJMC Team Brings Hope to Displaced Syrians



A homeless family seeks shelter. A baby sleeps in a stable. As the Christmas story was celebrated worldwide last month, the plight of Syrian refugees brought real meaning to the birth of Jesus for missionaries from St. John Medical Center in Westlake.

#### **Bay Village Police: Man Scammed for Six Grand**


On 12/21/2013, at 1230 hrs, a resident in the 24000 block of Wolf Rd. reported he had been the victim of a scam. A male with a Jamaican accent had called the victim telling him he had won the Publishers Clearing House Prize, but needed to pay the taxes before he could collect his winnings. The victim proceeded to purchase between \$6,000 and \$7,000 in Green Dot cards to pay the taxes. The last time he spoke with the scammers, the male told the victim he had paid the taxes, but needed to go through a broker to collect his winnings. The scammer told *continued on page 2*

## Story of the Year SJMC Team Brings Hope to Displaced Syrians

"This is the season for giving and love. The story of the Holy Family reminds us that there are many people living in the equivalent of stables and barns in Jordan, just a few miles from their home country of Syria," said Dr. Sayed, an internal medicine specialist with offices on the campus of St. John Medical Center.

"There are over six million people displaced there, and half of them are children," he said. "This crisis is now in its third year. And this year it is cold



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over there. People are freezing, children are showing symptoms of Post Traumatic Stress Syndrome, and there are shortages of food and medicine."

The SJMC team made its last trip to Jordan Nov. 15-22. They are going again in January. Their destination is the Zaatari Refugee Camp — a refugee community on the outskirts of Amman, Jordan. More than 160,000 displaced persons from Syria call it home.

Dr. Sayed, Hoops (a labor and delivery nurse), and Vacco, (a surgical nurse at SJMC), have traveled to Syria for a year now. They go under the auspices of the Salaam Cultural Museum Medical Mission - a nonprofit organization that provides aid and assistance to displaced Syrians who have fled to neighboring countries to escape the violence in Syria.

"It is a reminder to the Syrian government that Americans do care," said Dr. Sayed.

The three fund their trips personally and also rely on donations.. They take suitcases packed with medical supplies. They set up clinics in private apartments and tents, pharmacies in storage units and medical care wherever a sympathetic door is opened.

The atrocities they witness are extraordinary. They have stories of children being shot in front of parents, torture and deprivation of physical necessities basic to life.

"They wait for us to come back every two months," said Dr. Sayed. "And they offer us anything they may have in appreciation, even if it is just a little food."

"You run on adrenaline the whole time you are there," said Hoops. "The parents of teenage girls, they don't even have time to explain to these girls about the adolescent changes that are going on with their bodies. They are too busy running for their lives."

The sponsoring website, www.SalaamCulturalMuseum.org, is replete with stories of survival, torture and human suffering caused by this civil war.

One blog post on the site talks of a dad and his 14-year old daughter who attempted to go grocery shopping. They were ambushed by the regime. The dad was shot in both legs but not killed. Why? The shooters wanted him to be alive while they pulled the trigger on his daughter.

"I was later told that the regime is known for shooting the parent in front of their child...but ensuring they are only wounded and unable to move...so, that they can then shoot the child in front of the parent...so, he can watch his child die," reports the blogger. "This is exactly what happened." You can read the entire

com/ "People usually go to Jordan to visit Biblical sights. We go to makeshift clinics," said Dr. Sayed. "We have to do it!"

Despite the scale and duration of the Syrian humanitarian crisis, government and international intervention has not come. "The United Nations has

> been asked for \$6 billion in aid, but even that would only come to a thousand dollars for each refugee," said Dr. Sayed.

"We are only able to do this one person at a time. But any effort will help," said Hoops. "When you go, you think it is just going to be a drop in the bucket. But you visit clinics, you help people, you see just what a difference you can make."



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## **Bay Schools: Take the Pledge**

Bay Village parents have announced a signatory pledge drive directed towards increased parental engagement to help reduce substance abuse among the community's youth. The pledge form is on the Bay Village School District website at: http://www.bayvillageschools.com/BayVillageParentPledge

Due to the unfortunate presence of alcohol and drug use among the youth in Bay Village and surrounding communities, the Bay Village PTA has started a pledge drive. For many years the city, through their police force, and the schools, through their drug education programs, has been trying to fight and reverse the bad choices that some children have taken. The time has come for parents to take a more active role in this fight. When DEA agent, Bob Stutman, talked to the community in the early fall, the question was asked: "Can we say, we tried our best to pre-vent the next death?" The Bay Village Parent Pledge drive is an effort to reverse the growing substance abuse statistics. The mission is simple: To promote greater parental responsibility to keep our children drug and alcohol free. Bay Village PTA believes this to be a fundamental piece in keeping our youth substance abuse free while understanding that there are no simple solutions. The pledge was developed by Bay Village PTA, with the input of Bay Family Services and Bay Village Police Detective Krolkosky, to reflect the issues that are observed locally.

The pledge addresses three main facets that are observed in our community's families:

Pledge Point 1) To never condone alcohol or

drug use for children. Tacit denial or condoning of a little bit of drug or alcohol abuse by our youth is not acceptable. By signing the pledge, parents will realize that they do not stand alone in our community when they live by this rule in their house.

Pledge Point 2) To be an active participant in my children's lives by regularly having open communication, participating in family meals, and maintaining awareness of my children and what they are doing. Substance abuse often happens within our own homes and when our children are left unsupervised. Parents need to be active participants in their children's lives by talking to them on an ongoing basis, being active in their lives, and setting rules and expecting the rules to be followed. Research clearly shows that in the fight against drugs

and alcohol, family relationships do matter. There is a direct correlation between how many dinners a family has together and the likelihood of substance abuse. Increasing the number of meals families have together is something every Bay Village parent can do.

Pledge Point 3) To recognize that I am the most powerful influence in my children's lives and take ongoing responsibility for educating my children about substance abuse. Bay Village parents and guardians cannot forget that they are THE most powerful influence in their children's lives. The drug landscape is constantly changing. It is every parent's responsibility to educate themselves and their children, on an ongoing basis, about the different types and the effects of substance abuse. Parents are the most significant role model in their


In Westlake, City Council members and Law Director John Wheeler were sworn in by Ohio Supreme Court Justice Terrence O'Donnell on Jan. 2.


