

PROPERTY TAX CALCULATOR How Much Will You Pay?

2024 is a sexennial (six years) reappraisal year in which Cuyahoga County reevaluates all properties in the county. It's coming this summer.

Homeowners are expected to see reappraisals go up by as much as 30 per cent. The last reappraisal was in 2017. Reappraisals went up by about 16 per cent. But because of the recent surge in home prices, you may expect to see much larger increases.

That means if your home is currently appraised at \$250,000, a 30 per cent reappraisal increase will place its value at \$325,000.

If a Westlake home has a current appraisal of 250,000, taxes may be expected to currently be \$4848 annually. If the new appraisal raises the home's value to \$325,000 (a 30 percent increase) taxes will rise to \$6302.

If a Bay Village home has a current appraisal of \$250,000 current taxes are probably about \$6999. If the new appraisal raises the home's value to \$325,000 (a 30 percent increase) taxes will rise to \$9099.

Sticker shock anyone?

How Are Taxes Calculated?

Residents often ask how property taxes are calculated. Here is an example for a Bay Village \$100,000 home (as posted by The City of Bay Village):

'He is always friendly and good with the kids. Some kids who were in my program for years went on to do bowling in high school. I think their love of bowling started at Bay Lanes.







- 1. Take 35% of Fair Market Value = \$35,000
- 2. Multiply #1 by the Residential millage for Bay Village (169.76) (CIty millages will vary).
- $3.35,000 \times .16976 = $5,941$
- 4. Reduce by the 920 Reduction (.479235) 5,941 *.479235 = \$2,847
- 5. Reduce by 10% if owner occupied and non-business ((5,941-2847) *.10=\$309)
- 6. \$5,941-2,847-309 = \$2,785 estimate for full year.

To simplify: for a residential property simply take the Market Value multiplied by the Tax as a Percentage of Market Rate (2.79%) = \$100,000 *.0279 = \$2,790.

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2024 LCCC Graduate Tim Kenny Proves Them Wrong

Prove them wrong.


That phrase is tattooed on the forearm of 2024 Lorain County Community College graduate Tim Kenny. He's been doing that since the day he was born.

Tim, 22, an Avon Lake High grad, was diagnosed with cerebral palsy shortly after birth. His mother, Robin, and her husband, Sean, adopted Tim when he was five days old, pre-diagnosis.

The doctors had a done an MRI of his brain and identified an area that they thought might cause some difficulties," Robin said.

Even after Tim's diagnosis of cerebral palsy, which is a group of disorders that affect a person's ability to move and maintain balance and posture, only time would tell what symptoms he would have and how severe they would be.

"He was a typical baby all the way until



His parents began physical therapy for Tim. And then occupational therapy. And then speech therapy.

"We kind of just kept adding and adding and adding," Robin said.

Throughout his schooling, Tim had both detractors telling him he couldn't, and supporters telling him he could. Physically, he has limited mobility in his hands and a contracted left arm. But for the most part, he has proved he can do everything his peers could do. It simply takes Tim more time.

Those everyday things people take for granted, like getting out bed and getting dressed, might take me and you five minutes. It could take Tim an hour."

Despite this, Tim was an active child. began playing soccer and stuck with

the sport for 15 years. And then, in seventh grade, his physical triumphs were complemented by a mental-confidence breakthrough. Robin calls it his "amazing shift."

"He was understanding everything in school. Everything was clicking," she said. "He was getting his homework done."

That shift, supported by educational advocates within the Avon Lake school system, stayed with Tim. He leaned into his mantra. Prove them wrong. It's equally inspiring and heartbreaking.

"I know people look at me differ-

them wrong."

"He always wanted to move on after high school," Robin said. "He wants a job in a field he loves, just like everyone else."

Because of his grades, Tim earned the Presidential Scholarship to Lorain County Community College.

"From the beginning, we've had great support at LCCC," Robin said. "The learning specialist, Jody Haserodt — amazing. It's so fun watching any of your kids make that transition, but it especially was with him."

Accessibility services helped Tim purchase specialized technology to support him in class and provided accommodations, like having a scribe take notes for him and allowing for extended testing time.

The support and assistance at Lorain County Community College was truly top notch," Tim said. "It was all just making sure that I succeeded. I honestly don't know where I would be without the guidance of LCCC."

Tim is very driven," Robin said. "He has been told multiple times by multiple people that he would not be able to do things in life, whether it be write, drive a car, build with Legos or play a particular Nintendo game. Once you tell Tim he can't do something, he generally finds a way to do it. Maybe it's not the conventional way, but he does find a way to do it."

In May 2024, Tim will do what some doubted he would. He will graduate from LCCC with an associate of science in data and analytics. After that, Tim plans to enroll in LCCC's University Partnership to earn his bachelor's degree from Western



data analytics and hopes to work in the sports industry one day.

No doubt those who have stuck around will be at LCCC on May 11 to watch Tim walk across the commencement stage and accept his diploma. It will be one moment in time that, for Tim, represents a lifetime of breaking down barriers, whether they were put in his way by cerebral palsy or those who doubted him. It will be a moment to recognize that he has and will continue to prove them wrong.

"I want to thank my parents for pushing me and putting me on the best possible path to success," Tim said. "I had to over-





their craft.





Sex Offender Arrested

On 4/13/24 at approx. 10AM, WPD received a call from a concerned citizen who reported that he believed that a male registered sex offender was acting suspiciously.

Specifically, the suspect was getting very "friendly with an adult female that had a toddler boy with her at the Bradley Woods Metroparks in Westlake.

Officers from the Westlake PD and the Metroparks PD responded but could not find the described male or the possible victims. A bit later, WPD received a call from a female reporting that she had been alerted by the original complainant who recognized the suspect male from the Sheriff's registry website.

The original caller only knew the man as "Tao." The mom thought about the interactions and realized that the male had been playing with her toddler and had identified himself as a "teacher in body language." The Metroparks took a sex crime report.

A WPD dispatcher dug through old records and police databases to find a positive identity on the suspect who in fact had been a Tier 1 sex offender who's requirement to register with the authorities had recently expired after 15 years. The information was passed to Met Parks Detectives who developed probable cause to obtain felony warrants for Gross Sexual Imposition.

On 4/23/24, WPD officers served the warrant on the 61yo Westlake man at his residence. He was arrested without further incident and turned over to the Metroparks PD to answer to the charges.

Dispatcher Commended: On 4/26/24, Chief Bielozer presented WPD Dispatcher Ross with a letter of commendation for her work on the case. It read in part:

"You demonstrated initiative and applied your skills and experience to the best of your ability. Recognizing the potential threat to the community presented by this suspicious person, you properly prioritized your discretionary time and uncovered critical intelligence. Your instinct to act in defense of our most vulnerable population was the critical step in identifying the offender and facilitating his arrest.'

You should take particular pride in knowing that your work has directly led to the removal of the worst type of criminal from our community before he could victimize another child.

Defrauded for Thousands

On 4/19/24 at about 10:30AM, a citizen came to WPD to report a fraud. The man had received a phone call from a male subject who identified himself as being a rep from the Federal Trade Commission. The fraudster told the victim that that he was investigating improper withdrawals from the victim's bank accounts and that for the FTC to continue to investigate the crime and arrest the perpetrator, the victim would have to wire thousands of dollars to a bank in New York. Of course, the scammer promised that all the funds would be returned once the investigation was complete. Unfortunately, the complainant did wire thousands of dollars to the scammers. Detectives are looking at the trail of fraudulent accounts used in the theft by deception.

Teguila & Firearm

On 4/21/24 at approx. 2AM, an officer stopped a vehicle on I90 at Crocker for speeding and weaving. Upon approaching the car, the officer noticed an open bottle of Patron tequila next to the female operator. The driver said that she was coming from "Bay Village Boulevard," which does not exist. She appeared intoxicated. The 35yo Cleveland resident said that she did not feel comfortable performing roadside field sobriety tests and was arrested for OVI. Along with the open container, the officers located a loaded handgun in the car. The driver refused a breath test and was charged with OVI, speeding and having weapons while intoxicated. She was later released to a sober ride.

Felony Drug PossessionOn 4/24/24 at about 2:45PM, an officer stopped a vehicle on I90 at Crocker for equipment violations. Investigation revealed that the 41yo Middleburg Hts female was in possession of a small bag of suspected methamphetamine along with another small bag of an unknown brown powdery substance. After a cut straw was located nearby in the vehicle, the driver admitted that she snorts meth. The female was arrested and charged with felony drug possession. Additional charges are pending lab analysis of the confiscated substances.

This is Confusing!

The fraudster stayed on the phone with the victim as she withdrew cash from the bank and attempted to deposit it into an ATM at a convenience store. Luckily, the ATM was unable to accept the cash and the victim became aware of the scam before losing the \$10,000 in cash. A report was generated for documentation.

Car Vandalized

A customer there returned to their vehicle in the lot and discovered that someone had spray painted their vehicle. 

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

So he said to the man, 11 "I tell you, get up, take your mat and go home." 12 He got up, took his mat and walked out in full view of them all. 
